Commentary: Information Vacuum Left by Church and Parents Filled by Culture

Imagine my surprise when I read the headline "How the seeker-sensitive, consumer church is failing a generation." I've long thought that myself, but to see it in a slightly more hipster publication like Christianity Today is a curious occurrence. But I nearly fell out of my chair when I read this line from the article:

"What does co-dependence look like within a church? Avoiding sections of Scripture out of fear that certain power pockets will be offended. Believing that repeat attendance depends primarily upon the staff's seamless execution of Sunday morning—rather than the manifest presence of God. Eliminating doleful songs from the worship repertoire because they might contradict the through line that 'following Jesus is all gain.'"

The writer goes on to state something I've been trying to yell from the rooftops for a while now, that Jesus simply didn't care if He offended someone with His Gospel. Having been part of churches that avoided particular topics like the plague for fear, I assume, of being deemed too something-or-other, this truth has become dear to me.

The reality that the church is flailing and failing younger generations has never been more obvious than it is today. While neo-evangelicals like Rachel Held Evans tells the blogosphere that Millennial's don't like the traditional church and want it to be more modern to fit their social worldview, the church continues to sink. As the church sinks, so do families. As families sink, so does the country.

The battle to win the day over social issues revolves around winning the hearts and minds of Millennial's and younger generations. When combined with a church that avoids any topic remotely considered "political," we are losing the battle to a connected society that is streaming content to our kids 24/7. Rather than being a counter-cultural voice for biblical truth in the lives of students and young professionals, many churches have simply skipped over critical issues such as abortion, homosexuality, and gender roles.

But that doesn't mean those who oppose the biblical position on these moral issues are doing the same. A recent article says that the key to winning over young voters is to support gay marriage. Homosexual advocates believe that younger generations are more supportive because they have gay friends and seek to capitalize on the emotionalism of the issue to win key legal victories.

A separate article quotes President Obama back in 2007 when he said teaching sex education to kids in Kindergarten was "the right thing to do." The public education system believes teaching 5 year olds about sex is "right"? As students progress through public education they are indoctrinated into a worldview that believes casual sex, sexual experimentation, blurred gender lines, homosexuality, and arbitrary morals is normal. Of course this leads to a belief that abortion is also morally acceptable.

Yet another article shows the opposition to home schooling. Or perhaps it is better stated the opposition to anything other than public education. Atheists decided to protest a home school convention in Texas because the convention hosted creation speaker Ken Ham. The atheists believe it is anti-science, abuse, and immoral to teach Creation to students. I suppose the irony of the fact that Christians and creationists believe it is anti-science, abuse, and immoral to teach evolution to students is lost on them. They are essentially demanding that people be made to conform to their worldview.

But that's the point. We are losing a generation of kids to a worldview that embraces casual sex, cohabitation, homosexuality, blurred gender lines and roles, abortion on demand, and even evolution. We are losing them not because our arguments are not sound. Not because we don't have truth on our side. Not because our opposition is "hipper" than we are. We are losing them because churches have failed to teach and train the next generation.

As churches have remained silent on these issues, so too have parents. The disconnect between the home and the church has grown to the point where children are walking away from their faith after high school to embrace a humanistic worldview of pleasure. Parents have assumed that if the church doesn't talk about an issue, they don't need to talk about it either. The silence from both the church and parents has created an information vacuum being quickly filled by the culture.

The truth is, seeker sensitive, consumer churches are indeed failing a generation. They are failing to properly equip students, parents, and families with the necessary resources and knowledge to stand firm against the slings and arrows of a culture that seeks to destroy. The result is a conscience seared by the hyper-sexualized entertainment culture that says moral absolutes doesn't exist.

We are at a point in church and national history where the need for strong, biblically based, Gospel centric voices speaking truth to the critical issues of our culture is sorely needed. Pastor, you know the truth, share it fearlessly. Parents, those are your kids, take responsibility for educating and training them according to the values of the Bible. Let the offended be offended. But let us never compromise the absolute truth of Scripture to win people, or votes.
